



Home to two globally recognized leaders in manufacturing, Dorchester County has pioneered the metal mesh industry for over a century. The county's resiliency combined with its growth opportunity and its ever ready workforce has retained local manufacturers enabling them to grow and expand into high-tech frontrunners in the industry.

Cambridge International and GKD-USA are part of a world-class local industry cluster of conveyor belting, filtration, and architectural mesh. Most products that consumers touch every day come off of conveyor belts, and there is a good chance they were manufactured on belting made in Dorchester County. Food products, building materials, and automotive parts represent only a

fraction of the products that are carried on belting from Dorchester County.

Dorchester native Tom Powley joined the wire mesh manufacturer GKD as CEO of its North American division in 1997. He believed then – as he does today – that Dorchester's reputation as a center of metal fabric manufacturing and strategic Mid-Atlantic location made it the perfect location for GKD's U.S. headquarters. Spocott Windmill Holds Earth
Day Open House

Join the spring open house festivities on Earth Day this Saturday, April 19, 2014, at the Spocott Windmill Complex located in Lloyds on Route 343, seven miles outside of Cambridge. The windmill complex houses a nineteenth-century village featuring the Spocott Windmill, Castle Haven School House, Colonial Tenant Cottage, and Blacksmith Shop.

The local destination serves as an educational tool to preserve area history and the culture of Dorchester County. The complex will be open to visitors during its annual Earth Day celebration from 10AM – 4PM. George Radcliffe, member of the Windmill Foundation, noted, "Earth Day gives us an opportunity to not only showcase county history but the

environment that is so much a part of who we are."

Environmental and historical exhibits, nature activities for the children, a horseshoe tournament, tours, and Native American presentations by Daniel Firehawk Abbott are just a few of the many events that will be open to the public with no admission charge. Just added this year, an Arbor Day Tree Giveaway will also take place.

Spocott was built in 1972, modeled after the original mill that was destroyed in the great blizzard of 1888. English settlers brought the post windmill technology with them and used it heavily in Dorchester County since the land is flat and allows for good conditions. "At one time, there were eighteen known post windmills in Dorchester County, four of which were in the Neck District," said Radcliffe. "The county was one of the last on the East Coast where windmills were operated commercially to grind grain."

Dorchester County's Alternative
Agriculture Ranch

Located in Hurlock, MD, SB Farms features Dorchester County's only bison farm. Operated by the Edwards family, SB Farms includes a healthy herd of bison raised in a clean environment. The alternative agriculture ranch began in 1995 and continues to thrive. Selling directly to the community, as well as the farmer's market and local restaurants, bison is readily available in Dorchester County.

"We raise America's first red meat," said Bill Edwards. "Our bison are raised without the use of antibiotics, growth stimulants or hormones." Offering a healthy alternative to other red meats, bison is very lean and should be cooked at lower temperatures for optimal taste. Edwards explained bison is truly native to the United States, and the other popular red meats were introduced during colonization.

The ranch uses best management practices to keep the bison healthy and our waterways clean. The Edwards served on the Chesapeake Bay's Choptank Tributary Strategies Team and planted native warm-season grasses in their pastures as an added way to ensure best practices.

Tours are available with appointments for parties of 10 people or more and priced at \$10 per person. Tours feature the bison up close in their own habitats and last approximately an hour.
